Public Conservation Lands Scare Up a Spooky Halloween Night

DuPuis Management Area at the Martin/Palm Beach county line offers creepy critters, haunted hayrides and not-too-frightening family fun



- **WHAT:** Visit the DuPuis Management Area for ghostly family fun under the stars and in the wild at the annual Haunted Halloween Celebration if you dare. The popular event features:
 - Fun kids games and crafts
 - Trick-Or-Treat Trail
 - Hair-raising haunted house for ages 10 and older
 - All-ages howling hayride through the woods
 - Creepy critters from the Treasure Coast Wildlife Center such as bats, owls, snakes and spiders

Refreshments will be for sale. A \$10 fee per vehicle will go to support the Florida Center for Environmental Studies at DuPuis and the Indiantown Education Coalition.

The DuPuis Management Area is a 22,000-acre natural area open to public recreation throughout the year. The area was part of the historic Everglades and features an ecologically diverse and significant vegetative community.

Throughout South Florida, the District provides recreational access to its public lands while continuing to manage them to support environmental restoration, water supply, water quality and flood control missions. At present, the District owns approximately 621,000 acres of land that are open to the public. Many of these properties are in their natural state or have enhancements such as picnic tables, informational kiosks, primitive campsites and hiking trails.
