SFWMD Hosts Workshop on Kissimmee Basin Water Reservation

WHAT: As part of a multi-year effort to identify how much water needs to be set

aside to protect the Kissimmee Basin ecosystem, a series of public meetings has been scheduled to share information and gather input from interested residents, governments, businesses and other stakeholders. The

next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 26, in Kissimmee.

Florida law supports the creation of water reservations to set aside water for protection of fish and wildlife or public health and safety. The South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) Governing Board in June initiated a rulemaking process to reserve water needed for environmental protection of the Kissimmee Basin, which includes the Kissimmee River, the Kissimmee Chain of Lakes and surrounding tributaries. The reservation is part of the \$620 million plan to restore the river and more than 27,000 acres of wetlands along the Central Florida waterway.

Water is the lifeblood that makes the Kissimmee Basin home to more than 300 fish and wildlife species. For more information about Kissimmee River restoration and rulemaking for the water reservation, visit www.sfwmd.gov/kissimmee.
