STA 3/4 is one of six similar constructed wetlands built as part of the Everglades Construction Project authorized by the Everglades Forever Act. Since 1994, these STAs have retained 960 metric tons of phosphorus, preventing it from entering the Everglades.

In all, Florida has invested more than to \$2 billion toward the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan and an additional \$1.8 billion to improve water quality in the Everglades.

Recreational Opportunities

There are many ways to explore the outdoors and see the native wildlife at STA 3/4. Be sure to bring your favorite camera or pair of binoculars.

Marked trailheads guide hikers and bicyclists along four miles of trails and side loops that meander into different wildlife habitats. Quiet visitors can get close enough to see vivid pink roseate spoonbills and great blue herons. Trails are open Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays and Mondays from sunrise to sunset.

The boat ramp provides access to 27 miles of exterior canals that are great spots for fishing, kayaking and canoeing. Motorboats are permitted in the exterior canals where largemouth bass and other fish are prime prey for eagles, hawks and anyone with a fishing pole. The boat ramp is open daily from sunrise to sunset.

WHAT'S AT WORK

The many species visitors now see at STA 3/4 are living in a marsh that was converted from a vast agricultural area.

Within the constructed wetland, the South Florida Water Management District is monitoring experimental plots of vegetation to better understand how algae and wetland plant species filter nutrients from water. Scientists and water managers are also collecting data about water quality and working to keep water flows moving at the best rates for phosphorus removal.

VISITOR GUIDELINES

Stay on designated trails.

This is a natural area. Trash cans are not provided, so take out what you bring in. Please do not litter.

using "green technology" to remove excess phosphorus from urban and agricultural runoff. Too much of the nutrient phosphorus promotes an overgrowth of plant life and alters the habitat that Florida's native plants

> and animals need to thrive in the Everglades. STAs remove phosphorus from water by channeling it through shallow marshes filled with aquatic plants

that take up or absorb the phosphorus.

The marshy environment also attracts wading birds, ducks, turtles, fish, alligators and other native wildlife.
