

WATER SHORTAGE WATCH BRIEFING Keeping an Eye on Water Supply

Report for April 11, 2011

To keep the public informed about dry conditions impacting much of Central and South Florida, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) is issuing the following briefing.

District-wide Conditions

The District's 16-county region experienced the driest October-to-February period since recordkeeping began nearly 80 years ago. While regional rainfall for March was average, it was not sufficient to ease drought conditions. Long-term forecasts call for extreme dry conditions through the rest of the annual dry season.

Water Shortage Orders and Conservation Measures

Water Shortage Order – Landscape Irrigation

- <u>Modified Phase II restrictions</u>, effective March 26, limit landscape irrigation to two days per week throughout the District.
- Landscape irrigation using reclaimed water is not restricted under the order.
- Irrigation times vary by area:
 - Broward, Glades, Hendry, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Okeechobee, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties, the Reedy Creek Improvement District and cities within Lee County except Cape Coral – <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - o Charlotte, Highlands and Polk counties Just the Facts
 - The City of Cape Coral <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - Collier County, including the City of Naples <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - Unincorporated areas of Lee County <u>Just the Facts</u>

Water Shortage Order – Golf Courses

• <u>Modified Phase I restrictions</u>, effective March 26, require a 15-percent cutback for golf course irrigation in Broward, Collier, Glades, Hendry, Lee, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Okeechobee, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties.

Water Shortage Order – Lake Okeechobee Service Area (LOSA)

- A <u>water shortage order</u>, effective March 26, requires a 15-percent reduction in surface water withdrawals for all agricultural, nursery and diversion and impoundment users within LOSA.
 - LOSA includes portions of Okeechobee, Glades, Hendry, Lee, Martin, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties, and the Everglades Agricultural Area and portions of the Southern Indian Prairie Water Use Basin.

Water Shortage Order – Agricultural and Nursery Water Users in South Miami-Dade County

• A <u>water shortage order</u>, effective March 26, places Phase I restrictions on agricultural and nursery water users within the South Dade Water Use Basin. Users will limit the times and hours of irrigation operations.

Water Shortage Order – Southern Indian Prairie Water Use Basin

• An <u>operational order</u>, effective March 26, allows for District operation of certain bypass structures in the southern Indian Prairie Water Use Basin to implement the LOSA order.

Water Shortage Order – Permitted Water Users in Broward and Palm Beach Counties

- A <u>water shortage order</u>, effective March 26, places Phase I restrictions on agricultural, nursery and diversion and impoundment permittees that use or divert surface and ground water in these counties.
 - Withdrawals from surface waters by specified users will be reduced 15 percent.
 - Agricultural and nursery operations will limit the hours of irrigation.

Other Actions

Emergency Operations

• The SFWMD's Emergency Operations Center is currently at a Level 2 activation to monitor and plan activities associated with the 2011 Water Shortage.

Environment-Related Activities

- A native apple snail hatchery is under construction at Lemkin Creek. Native apple snails are the primary food source for the endangered Everglades snail kite.
- Bulrush planting continued in Stormwater Treatment Areas to enhance their performance in water quality improvements.

Navigation

- Recent rainfall temporarily improved navigation potential in the Kissimmee River. The S-193 navigation lock at Taylor Creek in Okeechobee County is open only on Saturdays and Sundays. These locks on the north shore of Lake Okeechobee remain closed:
 - S-135 at J&S Fish Camp in Martin County
 - o G-36 at Henry Creek in Okeechobee County
 - o S-127 at Buckhead Ridge in Glades County
 - o S-131 at Lakeport in Glades County
