WATER SHORTAGE WATCH BRIEFING Keeping an Eye on Water Supply

Report for June 15, 2011

To keep the public informed about dry conditions impacting much of Central and South Florida, the South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD) is issuing the following briefing.

District-wide Conditions

Extremely low rainfall totals at the onset of the wet season have intensified ongoing drought conditions. The wet season is off to its driest start in more than 20 years, following below-normal rainfall levels that began in October. Persistent rainfall is needed to replenish groundwater, canal and lake levels that are visibly depleted.

Water Shortage Orders and Conservation Measures

Water Shortage Order – Landscape Irrigation

- <u>Modified Phase II restrictions</u>, effective March 26, limit landscape irrigation to two days per week throughout most of the District.
- <u>Modified Phase III restrictions</u>, effective June 10, limit landscape irrigation to one day per week in the City of West Palm Beach's utility service area, including the City of West Palm Beach and the towns of South Palm Beach and Palm Beach.
- On June 13, the West Palm Beach City Commission implemented additional emergency restrictions for its utility service area. The resolution can be viewed <u>here</u>.
- Landscape irrigation using reclaimed water is not restricted by these orders.
- Irrigation times vary by area:
 - For Broward, Glades, Hendry, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Okeechobee, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties, portions of Osceola County, the Town of Windermere in Orange County and cities within Lee County except Cape Coral – Just the Facts
 - Charlotte, Highlands and Polk counties <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - Toho Water Authority Service Area (Osceola County) <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - The City of Cape Coral <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - o Collier County <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - Orange County, except the Town of Windermere <u>Just the Facts</u>
 - Unincorporated areas of Lee County <u>Just the Facts</u>

Water Shortage Order – Golf Courses

• <u>Modified Phase I restrictions</u>, effective March 26, require a 15-percent cutback for golf course irrigation in Broward, Collier, Glades, Hendry, Lee, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe, Okeechobee, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties.

Water Shortage Order – Lake Okeechobee Service Area (LOSA)

- <u>Modified Phase III restrictions</u>, effective May 19, require a 45-percent reduction in surface water withdrawals for all agricultural, nursery and diversion and impoundment users within LOSA.
 - LOSA includes portions of Okeechobee, Glades, Hendry, Lee, Martin, Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties and the Everglades Agricultural Area.

Water Shortage Order – Agricultural and Nursery Water Users in South Miami-Dade County

• <u>Modified Phase I restrictions</u>, effective March 26, require cutbacks on agricultural and nursery water users within the South Dade Water Use Basin. Users shall limit the times and hours of irrigation operations.

Water Shortage Order – Southern Portion of the Indian Prairie Water Use Basin

- An <u>operational order</u>, effective March 26, allows for District operation of certain bypass structures in the southern portion of the Indian Prairie Water Use Basin.
- <u>Modified Phase I restrictions</u> require a 15-percent reduction in surface water withdrawals for all agricultural, nursery and diversion and impoundment users.

Water Shortage Order – Permitted Water Users in Broward and Palm Beach Counties

- <u>Modified Phase I restrictions</u>, effective March 26, place Phase I restrictions on agricultural, nursery and diversion and impoundment permittees that use or divert surface and ground water in these counties.
 - Withdrawals from surface waters by specified users are reduced 15 percent.
 - Agricultural and nursery operations shall limit the hours of irrigation.

Other Actions

Emergency Operations

• The SFWMD's Emergency Operations Center is currently at a Level 2 activation to monitor and plan activities associated with the 2011 Water Shortage.

Navigation

٠

- The S-65E navigation lock between the Kissimmee River and Lake Okeechobee is closed with no locktender on duty due to declining water levels.
 - These locks on the north shore of Lake Okeechobee also remain closed:
 - S-135 at J&S Fish Camp in Martin County
 - o S-193 at Taylor Creek in Okeechobee County
 - o G-36 at Henry Creek in Okeechobee County

- o S-127 at Buckhead Ridge in Glades County
- S-131 at Lakeport in Glades County

Recreation

- An emergency order on April 26 prohibits building fires on certain District lands open for recreation.
 - The order covers 13 of the District's 16 counties. Polk, Osceola, and Orange counties are exempt from the ban because of recent rainfall.
 - The ban, which only applies to land managed by the District, means no fires in grills, fireplaces or fire rings until further notice.
